

AT CASTANEA, we are working to realize the potential of our communities by building a society that values intentionality, justice, and deep relationships. We stay on the edge, pushing into the potential of what can be - what are the emerging needs and questions from movement leaders? How can we move forward into a truly just and equitable food system? We provide a fellowship that is nimble, iterative, and reflective. Castanea creates a space where food system leaders have the time and resources to create a collective movement and camaraderie of innovators and leaders that understand the weight and joy of leading organizations and movements.

Castanea is an emergent fellowship that roots leadership development in liberatory practices. The fellowship grew out of the former Kellogg Food and Community Fellowship, a program with a deep alumni pool that has had tremendous impacts in the national food system. Castanea was initiated in 2017 to help catalyze the kind of transformational change that is essential to produce holistic solutions for our food system.

Our food system remains a key driver of some of our most entrenched societal problems: from widespread hunger and lack of healthy food access to an epidemic of dietrelated illnesses; from environmental impacts such as water and air pollution to the lack of competition in markets and devastated rural economies.

Changing systems of oppression requires us to change how we view and do leadership development work. We aim to support diverse, Black, Indigenous, and other leaders of color to ensure they have the time, space, and support for the creative and generative work needed for transformational change. Recognizing that food issues cannot be solved in isolation, this fellowship builds strong connections among leaders from a range of interest areas, regions, and strategies—to address more effectively the complexity of food system change.

The Castanea Fellowship offers:

- A 2-year fellowship program
- A hybrid model of virtual and in-person, place-based immersions
- Leadership development and skill building
- Peer support, mentorship, and movement community
- \$40,000 stipend over 2 years
- Robust alumni network and program



PROGRAMMING

Castanea's programming adapted to fully virtual platforms over the past two years. In addition to direct one on one support and technical assistance, program topics included:

Future programming for Castanea will be a hybrid of in-person place-based immersions and virtual gatherings and trainings. This hybrid model will balance the needs of sharing space to build relationships and mitigating the impacts of travel on communities and the environment. PODCAST

Rooted Wisdom is a fellows-led podcast that explores universal values rooted in ancestral wisdom. Fellow Aileen Suzara hosts fellows throughout the series to share personal stories and first-hand insight about local food communities. From organizing neighborhoods, holding an international mindset, and advocating for local food systems, the podcast aims to strengthen and heal relationships with food, and sow a future of sovereignty, resilience, and equity.

FUNDING AND RESOURCES

In an average year of full programming, almost 40% of Castanea's budget goes directly to fellows in the form of stipends to support their work on the ground in communities across the country. We identify those leaders doing the work in communities through an intensive and strategic cohort selection process.
